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Over 100 Disability and Aging Advocates Urge Ohio Senate to Take Action on Provider Crisis

Concerns intensify after funding for home and community-based services (HCBS) comes up short

in House-passed version of the budget bill.

Columbus, Ohio, (May 12, 2021)—The Ohio Home and Community-Based Services Coalition is urging the State Senate to support critical HCBS funding through Medicaid reimbursement rate increases. Throughout the budget process, the HCBS Coalition has advocated for a 10% increase across the biennium (5% in FY22 and 5% in FY23) in provider rates to help retain and recruit a much-needed workforce in order to increase access to care and fill Medicaid service gaps.

Advocates fear that lack of investment in home and community-based services will directly impact the HCBS workforce. An important part of this workforce includes home health aides, personal care aides, and nursing assistants who are low income and disproportionately Black, Indigenous, or People of Color. In addition, the skilled home health workforce also includes nurses, physical, occupational, and speech language pathologist who are currently reimbursed slightly less today than they were in 1998.

"The funding increase is critical, and long overdue. We are hopeful that this issue will be a key priority for the Ohio Senate during their budget deliberations," said Kerstin Sjoberg, spokesperson for the HCBS Coalition. "A key investment in home and community-based infrastructure now will provide a direct benefit to people. This increase will put money in the pockets of direct care workers and enable providers to recruit additional talent to the workforce."

Supporting direct care workers will help bring stability to the foundation of Ohio's HCBS system. A timely investment will help address the current provider crisis. It will also ensure that people with disabilities and older adults have the choice to age in place and live independently through the support of home care workers.

The need for home care workers is projected to increase 34% over the next 10 years. Increasing Medicaid reimbursement rates now will help providers better serve the Medicaid population, bolster more cost-effective forms of care and reduce workforce turnover. Most importantly, it will provide financial support directly to those workers providing in-home care so that they can afford to support their own families.

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The HCBS Coalition is made up of well-known disability and aging advocates in Ohio including: Disability Rights Ohio, Ohio Association of Area Agencies on Aging, Ohio Statewide Independent Living Council, Ohio Developmental Disabilities Council, and Ohio Council for Home Care and Hospice.
